

Extending the Table

Bringing the Lord's Table to our homebound members

I can remember the first time I tasted the bread and the juice.

The bread came in little wafer crackers and the juice almost overflowed the plastic cup.

My father was preaching in the small Baptist church in rural Oregon. I remember the brown hard pews with red hymnals in the back. A chrome plate came down the aisle, and I followed the example of my mother taking the bread and holding it until my father gave the instruction for us all to take it together. Then came the cup and I remember the juice was sweet; its taste lingered in my mouth for nearly a minute after I drank it.

One might expect this was a profound spiritual experience, but I was only five years old, and I hadn't had enough of life to recognize a profound spiritual experience. I only had spiritual experiences. My life in the church was made up of spiritual experiences. Singing those songs, the potluck following the service, my fathers sermons that I often slept through, and taking in the Lord's supper with the adults. These were the experiences of my childhood that were becoming part and parcel of my consciousness but had yet to develop into anything profound.

Two decades later I sat at a table following dinner with close friends. We had been through a lot of life together. We had laughed together, cried together, and found that through it all we were still together as friends. We filled our glasses with wine, broke bread and remembered that it was Christ's faithful presence that had carried us through deep waters. I was grateful for Jesus, for my friends, and for the sacrament of communion that seemed to hold both of these together.

A decade later I started in a new pastoral role at Calvin Presbyterian Church. Though I have often reflected on the meaning and mystery of the Lord's table, my journey at Calvin would expand my understanding even further. One of the most beautiful aspects of communion at Calvin is the idea that we *extend our table*. This is the actual language from our denomination's Book of Order about how we take the very elements from Lord's table together the first of each month, and we physically carry these to those who are unable to join us. Our table extends down the aisle, out the doors, and into the homes of those who are with us in spirit but not in body. What we say when we extend the table to those who have impaired mobility and function is that at Christ's table all are welcome and all are equal. None of us are more important than the other.

Because there are nearly 30 people who are part of our body at Calvin but cannot regularly be part of our communion service, we are currently limited in our ability to offer them communion regularly. But we are working on that. We are currently **assembling four teams** that will extend our communion table every month to those who are home-bound. Our hope is that this will mean that every month every person who desires would have the opportunity to share in the table. For those of us who worship regularly in the church building, this increase of regular contact will remind us that Calvin is a more diverse body than we physically see each week. My encouragement to you is to remember those who are home bound in your prayers and perhaps with a visit.

Also, we know that some of you may be called to join us in this ministry of extending the table. We welcome this calling and encourage you to contact the pastoral staff. All who have participated in this more intimate form of communion have expressed how much they are blessed by it.

Finally, this reminds us to savor the table of the Lord in the sweet fellowship of brothers and sisters. My hope is that the longer you live your life, the more profound the mystery of the table becomes to you. In our fellowship may we continue to eat and drink in the grace and peace of our Lord until He comes.

A little story about *The Communion Bread*

About 35 years ago ...

"Christi, I need your help making *The Communion Bread*," Nancy says to her 9 year old daughter.

"Every month you ask me to help mom! It's boring!" Christi says to her mom in an agitated voice.

Over time I learned to cherish those times I spent with my mom making *The Communion Bread*. We would talk about school, boys, my family, what I would do with my life, God, and so many more subjects. The routine was always the same.

Pulling out all the needed items is a special memory I have now: the mixing bowl, the special mixing fork, all the ingredients, the sheet trays, the rolling pin, the special rubber spatula, the wax paper, the special container to hold the finished bread, the huge chef's knife, and my mom's kitchen chair. I can still picture my mom sitting in her kitchen chair rolling out the dough after I plopped a glob of communion dough on the cookie sheet.

Six years ago ...

My kids and I walked through the doors of Calvin. Little did I know the journey I would be on back then. Back in 2011, some of that journey led me to offering to make *The Communion Bread*. Partly because I was spoiled with the family recipe of having *The Communion Bread* each month as I grew up, partly because I found out the people who usually provided the bread were retired, and mostly because God was urging me to offer my talents and follow in the footsteps of my mother, Nancy, my grandmother, Hazel, my great-grandmother, Mary, and my great-great-grandmother, Clara.

December of 2011

I offered to make a sample for session to see if they would like to have me make *The Communion Bread* for Calvin. The session agreed and I then embarked on making the first batch since I was a teenager in my mother's kitchen. I cannot lie, that first time making the bread, I shed tears of happiness, sorrow, longing, and love. The smells, the taste, the muscle memory, and the sights all came flooding back to me. Even though I was not in my mother's kitchen, I could envision it like it was yesterday. I could hear my complaint of having to help, hear the conversations between my mother and I, see her rolling out the dough, smell the bread as it baked, and most of all I could feel the love. My mother's love for me, for my family, and for God, all her love was there, with me, while I baked.



Today, I am proud to be the **fifth generation** in my family to carry on the tradition of making *The Communion Bread*. I am proud that my kids and my Calvin family can partake in this tradition. Every time I enter the kitchen to bake the bread, my world slows a little and I find myself mixing not only the bread dough, but also my memories and my love. I am making the bread for myself, my family past, my kids, my church family, and most of all for my Jesus, who died for me and for you.

Here is His Body, broken for you.



Renovating Your Life

During last month's windstorm, an enormous tree two houses away came crashing down through my neighbor's yard and onto our back patio. As the giant white pine broke apart, catapulting chunks of trunk and branches punctured holes in our deck and ripped off part of a gutter. Regrettably for my neighbors, damage to their roof, windows, and siding was worse. While the tree itself has now been cut up and hauled away, the impact will be felt for weeks as we rebuild and restore what was ruined.



Sometimes by choice, sometimes by force, we have to renovate things. What is broken and worn out in our lives must be repaired and refurbished, and this goes beyond just the things we own. It's a truth that applies to the whole of life, especially for those of us who are in Christ. Ephesians 4:22-24 instructs us: "Everything—and I do mean everything—connected with that old way of life has to go. It's rotten through and through. Get rid of it!"



Take on an entirely new way of life—a God-fashioned life, a life renewed from the inside and working itself into your conduct as God accurately reproduces his character in you" (The Message). This will be our focus together this spring: "**Renovating Your Life.**"

Jesus, our Master Builder, wants to do some heavy construction with you, to make you into God's best version of you. With Christ, faith supplants doubt; flourishing replaces floundering; grace triumphs over shame and condemnation; purpose and meaning take over for futility; joy and hope emerge from despair and fear; and love wins. And Jesus, of course, is also our blueprint for this transformation in life, which includes our hearts, minds, bodies, and spirits. It is what Christians through the ages have called "spiritual formation," the grace-driven renovation of your whole life after the pattern of Jesus with and for the sake of others.

Beginning Sunday, April 10, our worship services will explore God's design for our growth and formation in Christ, God's part and our part in the process, and the tools we use to help us grow.

If you are not already, I also urge you to be in a small group each week this spring where you can go deeper with the weekly themes using study guides provided; or you can work through one of the related DVD-based curricula Calvin offers. By the end of our 10-week series, you should have a clearer sense of where God's Spirit is working in your life, and have a grace-based action plan with concrete steps for how you are "Renovating Your Life."

Calvin's Hands and Feet in Cambodia

What a privilege it is to be a part of Calvin's outreach in Cambodia!

We serve with an organization called **Act Beyond** (beyond.org), that forms small missionary teams among unreached people groups (UPGs) who work by God's power to catalyze movements of disciples making disciples in such a way that whole societies can experience transformation. Our part in this is to behave a bit like Barnabas from the book of Acts, pouring into local "Pauls" in our context.

3 Tiers of Ministry

We have 3 tiers, or levels, of ministry involvement in Cambodia:

1) Where we have bonds of trust and friendship, we do Discovery Bible Studies (DBS). Just prior to our return to the USA, we had two evenings per week with two couples. There is no creation story in Khmer Buddhism. As we told the creation story, our friend Sok Noeun said, "The monks in my village said we came from monkeys!" With the fall of Satan story, "Satan reminds me of our Prime Minister!" With the first sin, "Now that's why it is so hard!" When brother killed brother, which is exactly what happened during the Khmer Rouge (1975-79), he said with tears, "It is just getting worse and worse!" When it came time to share the gospel, Sok Noeun and his Aunt Mohm were so ready to trust Jesus alone - anyone could have led them to Jesus!

2) With other missionaries, we train through the Jonathan Training, based on 1 Samuel 14 when Jonathan and his armor bearer charge the enemy, saying, "Nothing can stop the Lord from saving, by many or by few!" We work to equip others in evangelism and discipleship and spin off into small groups called Communities of Practitioners (COPs) for getting traction as evangelists and disciples that make disciples. We do a lot of on-the-street prayer and evangelism in the darkest parts of the city. We help train and lead small teams of mainland Chinese missionaries (from the house church movement) who come to Cambodia for training into Chinese-speaking parts of the city. We are also a part of an intercessors network called Firewall, and we have been praying for the whole Body of Christ, expatriate and Khmer, for healing, reconciliation and renewed desperation for God's lost children.

3) With isolated teams in the provincial areas, we lead small teams to learn, encourage and equip. We have access to resources and training in the capitol city that these friends do not have access to. We have found that periodic trips are a great means towards finding synergy and cross-pollination towards furthering God's desires in the region.

A Vignette

A window to understanding

It was mid-February 2014, about two weeks after Chinese New Year. I was with a small team of intercessors walking an alleyway community surrounding a Chinese-Cambodian traditional market, and the Neak Tha - or 'old person spirit' - parades were about to begin. And what happens is, several spirit mediums, dressed like Chinese deities went to a nearby temple and were filled or possessed by demons. Some were obviously just acting - but others, I'm convinced, were not. Then they would cut their tongues on swords and lick spirit paper and this paper would then be sold to business owners for good luck and prosperity in the coming year. I saw young families holding up their babies like it was the Rose Parade, but to receive stamps of blood on the back of their necks. It was then I understood. (photos, next page.)

You know, we often don't see things as they are, but as we are. I thought the people we had been sharing Jesus with were like me... just trying to make ends meet, providing for their families etc. While all this is true, the foundations of their worldview are very different from mine. In Cambodia there are generations of people in bondage to fear and demonic powers... pushed down and hidden away from the love of God.

Now... how to bridge the gap?



Shoreline Mayor Sheri Winstead proclaimed September 21, 2015, "Mayor's Day of Concern for The Hungry" and spotlighted the Weekend Back Pack Program!

Seven years ago

This program began with a Calvin Small Group, gathered around a dining room table, following God's lead to make just seven weekend food packs for hungry kids at Einstein Middle School! Today, because of the grace and love of God for these hurting children, nine Shoreline churches are partnering with 11 schools, sending out 247 Weekend Packs each Friday!

Last fall a website was launched, in an effort to make the local community aware of the needs and to invite them to come alongside us. **Turning Point**, a community non-profit, is the fiscal agent for this site. Their director created the website and it is really wonderful! You can find out what the need is in specific schools or what churches are partnering and where, at www.food4kidsshoreline! This is also a good place to send an employer or other business that might want to donate to help the hungry kids in Shoreline.

About 25 Calvin people work as a team to deliver 55 food packs per week. We continue to serve **Einstein, Parkwood Elementary** (shared with Turning Point) and **Shorewood High School**. It takes a big team to accomplish this. Thanks to those who help shop, set up, pack bags, haul food around, contribute money, donate food, and pray for the kids who receive the bags! It absolutely could not be done without all of you! No one ever complains, and everyone gives and serves joyfully!

The work that God gave us to do seemed unfathomable seven years ago! But He has made a path and led us on each step of the journey! He has brought other churches to join us and has forged relationships of love and care between our church, the schools, and the community during our years in this ministry. God has blessed us in our desire to serve him. May He be glorified in all we say and do.

Calvin's increasingly unpredictable 15-year-old coffeemaker has just been replaced with a new commercial Bunn machine.



Calvin Library began a journey to have an online catalog and to improve our collection.

In January of 2016 we celebrated the accomplishment of both goals, thanks to the dedication of our volunteers **Cecile Hoeksema, Myra Leicester, and Carole Cannon**. They participated in many work “parties” as well as continue to staff the library Sunday mornings between services. Yes, it really took us five years!

Today our **collection is online and searchable from the Calvin web site**. Look under the “Resources” tab or go to

<http://www.calvinpc.org/library/>. There is also a print version of the catalog in the library at the check-out counter.

We have added more space for children’s books and updated and re-organized our adult collections. The library now contains 1971 items and continues to grow through contributions from our members. Thank you!

The library is always open, not just on Sundays. Check out items yourself using the check-out card inside each. (You may have to introduce the youth to how this works!) The library is also open to the outside groups that meet at Calvin.

Several of our members reflected on why they use the Calvin Library:

The Biography and Faith Journeys section is one of my favorites. If the pastor or another leader suggests a good book, I go to see if Calvin has it. 
