2015 Summer Worship

Well, we asked recently for your feedback on summer worship at Calvin – and respond you did.

As of press time for the Connections, Session has received 162 of the questionnaires distributed to the congregation in September, and we are grateful that so many people took the time to send their observations to us. Thank you.

Responses poured in from all ages – from Calvin’s youth to our most senior members. As one might expect, we are finding a full range of opinions. They include many positive comments, constructive criticisms, and helpful suggestions for the future. Again, thank you.

Numerous people wrote about how much they appreciated the time together in the single service, including the presence of children and youth in worship. Others noted that they enjoyed seeing people that they had not touched base with in a while. More than a few said they enjoyed the meals offered after services.

This is just a sample of comments:

“I enjoyed having the whole congregation together.”

“It felt like Calvin was having a revival.”

“It gave us a sense of community.”

Many people also expressed gratitude for the work of Summer Pastor **Tyler Easley** and other members of Calvin’s staff.

We also sought feedback on worship style, and you did not disappoint. Of those who had a preference, the

observations covered a wide and passionate spectrum, but in general we found that roughly two-thirds of your responses favored either blended or contemporary service styles. The remaining one-third favored a traditional service style.

At the same time, it is very important to note that a good number of you balanced your preferences with a sense of flexibility. Here is a sample of comments:

From a fan of traditional worship:
“I’m old fashioned, yet the blended service is also good.”

“I generally prefer anything that fills me with the Spirit.”

From a supporter of blended worship:
“A compromise that values different styles of approaching God.”

“Contemporary, but it’s all good.”

“Blended. There are wonderful traditions in both styles.”

“In the past, traditional, but after this summer I think the blended service would be better for Calvin.”

As for worship time, your responses covered the spectrum. Many liked the 10 a.m. start, and many others expressed no preference. Smaller numbers favored either the 8, 9:15 or 11 a.m. start times. But it’s within this discussion of worship where we found many expressions of support for a single service. Likewise, we also found support for multiple services, with no additional direction on times.

So, where do we go from here?

As for Session, we will be reviewing your feedback as we seek to discern how worship should be organized in the future. At the center of this process, we will be listening, praying and seeking to hear God’s voice.

Along the way, we will weigh additional questions signaled by your feedback. For example, how can Calvin’s decisions on worship help us focus our full attention on God each week? How can we best organize all the other activities for youth, children and families on Sundays? And how can we best care for all those who serve our children, youth and adults so faithfully?

As for you, you can help us with your prayers – we need them. Don’t hesitate to continue sharing your thoughts with individual elders and/or members of the church staff.

Finally, please continue to offer the generous spirit that we see in so many of the questionnaires. Even at points when we are not entirely in agreement, we can remain united in spirit by the grace of God. And it’s by God’s grace that we can grow into a richer life together.

What if each year Calvin started with a membership that was almost entirely new? And then during the year, what if we worked to form a community through Bible study and fellowship, learning about God and forging new relationships within about nine months?

Then, at the end of those nine months, what if we all go our separate ways, not to return? And September, the rebuilding process begins all over again?

Well, you can hardly be blamed for thinking, "That would be beyond tough for any church."

True, but this is exactly what **Campus Minister Milad Nakhla** does every fall at not one, not two, not three, but four community college campuses: **Edmonds, Shoreline, Everett and Cascadia.**

Through Bible studies and a range of activities on these campuses, Milad each year touches the lives of scores of students, many of them from countries from all over the world. It is an international ministry carried out at the local level.

It is a time-intensive, personal ministry that is forged through personal relationships amid the ups and downs of an academic year. Milad introduces many students to the Christian faith, extending hospitality and building personal relationships by extending pastoral care.

Moreover, he mentors young Christians to serve as leaders in their Bible study groups, so as these students move from two-year schools to larger universities they can connect with other believers and continue to grow in their life of faith.

Vision House Plans Expansion of Jacob's Well in Shoreline

What is Vision House?

Vision House is a transitional housing program for recently homeless single parents (mostly mothers) and their children. Their mission and vision are:

“To follow our Lord Jesus Christ in working with the poor and homeless to promote positive transformation of their lives. To eradicate homelessness by being a progressive, Christ-centered model providing quality housing with healing and support services that radically transform lives while inspiring and empowering others to replicate that model worldwide.”

Calvin has supported Vision House/Jacob's Well for more than four years.

A Little History

Vision House was founded by John and Susan Camerer of Renton in the late 1990's with facilities in Renton. In 2011, they broke ground for a second facility in Shoreline and with the involvement of individuals, businesses, churches, community groups and foundations, the facility was built debt-free. This new facility was originally given the unique name of “Jacob's Well,” although as it has become a part of the larger organization, it is now more often known as “Vision House Shoreline.”



Currently there is a three-story facility with 12 apartments, counseling and administrative offices, a community center and a small childcare center for before-and-after school care. In 2013, Calvin “adopted” a one-bedroom apartment, completely furnishing and decorating it down to toothbrushes in the bathroom and food in the refrigerator.

In early 2014, an occupancy permit and license for the child care center were granted and the first residents moved in. For Christmas 2014, Calvin adopted two families and provided generous gifts for all members of those families as well as food for a festive Christmas dinner (with plenty to spare). At Easter, a Calvin small group organized a celebration for the children, and in May, twelve Calvin folks attended the annual fund raising luncheon.

Recently, Calvin collected over \$1000 in gift cards for families to outfit the kids with back-to-school shoes and clothes. Individual Calvin members have provided tutoring, childcare during Bible studies, and cleaned an apartment when a family moved on.

A Program that Makes a Difference

Vision House is not simply a residence. The goal is to re-integrate residents into the community through adequate housing, counseling, child care, food, clothing, education and vocational training, life skills development, and employment. Residents are allowed and encouraged to stay in the apartments for 18 months to two years in order to make the changes they need and gain the skills to support themselves and their families. Residents may stay longer than two years when they pursue a four year degree. They are required to abide by the Vision House no-tolerance policy to drug and alcohol abuse and to meet with their case manager weekly to set goals, outline action plans, and receive support and accountability in reaching their goals.

What's Next?

Vision House Shoreline is embarking on **phase two** of the facility. They will be seeking funding and support to **add a second building with eight additional apartments and a family support center.**

CALL TO ACTION FOR ACTION TEAM MEMBERS

Calvin will continue to support existing programs as well as the creation of the new facility. To accomplish this, we are forming a Vision House Action Team. That Action Team will work to plan and coordinate activities of various groups.

Initial Action Team members are **Dorothy Lindstrom, Darlene Miller, and Donna Miller-Parker.** We are actively looking for others to join us. On October 11, from 10:30 – 11:00 am in the Fireside Room, you will have the opportunity to hear more details about programming at Vision House and to ask questions about possible ways to be involved.

A Bit of History

In 2005 Calvin “adopted” the Khmer people of Cambodia as an Unreached People Group and committed to spread the gospel among them by forming partnerships of encouragement and support with Cambodian Christians in that Buddhist country. Since then, 23 people from Calvin have traveled to Cambodia to build relationships with our Christian brothers and sisters. Our mission initiative has supported **Jeremy and Maria Chase’s** ministry to the unreached and helped build a new generation of young Christian leaders by providing support for higher education and practical spiritual disciplines and servant leadership.

Our travel teams represent you as we renew friendships and bring your greetings and support with prayer and ‘presence’. We look forward to sharing our experiences with you when we return. Thank you in advance for your prayers.

Brian Maher to Share in Worship on October 25

What is a Deacon Meet and Greet? When is it?

Your deacons have been active over the summer and have personally visited with many of you. In some cases, they dropped you a note or spoke with you over the phone. The Meet and Greet is an opportunity for you, and for your deacon, to put faces with names. Do plan to drop into Fellowship Hall and give your deacon a hug. There will be someone at the door with a list in case you do not know who your deacon is and he/she will point them out to you if necessary. **Deacons will be adorned with balloons** color coded to the color by their photo displayed on the Bulletin Board in Fellowship Hall.

What, you may ask, does a Deacon do?

We're glad you asked:

What Do Deacons Do? *

Deacons provide comfort and care to those in need or distress, to the ill, and to the friendless. The office of Deacon was created by the Twelve Apostles, as described in the Book of Acts, to make sure that the needs of their number were being met, and met fairly. Deacons are the "hands and feet" of Calvin.

What Do Deacons Do, Exactly? *

- Regularly pray for the 20-25 families assigned to them.
 - Read the prayer newsletter and their personal email to be alerted when their families need help/prayer.
 - Keep in touch with their families to see that any needs for comfort or care are met.
 - Provide practical help as needed: meals, ad-hoc transportation, get-well cards, hospital visits.
 - Assist with Memorial receptions, if able.
 - Assist with Community Care, primarily the Food Pantry, if able.

Our intention is that every member and regular attendee at Calvin has an assigned deacon upon whom you can call. If you find that you do not have a deacon assigned to your family, please let Judy Runions know so she can connect you right away. You can find out by asking the person standing at the Fellowship Hall door with the family list. We want to connect with you, to pray for you, and to help and support you in any way we can.




